# EL DORADO COUNTY FIRE CHIEFS' ASSOCIATION URBAN SEARCH and RESCUE (USAR) RESPONSE AGREEMENT EFFECTIVE DATE: July 1, 2015

The Urban Search and Rescue (USAR) organizational module is designed to provide supervision and control of essential functions at incidents where technical rescue expertise and equipment are required for safe and effective rescue operations. USAR operations are unique in that specialized training and equipment are required to mitigate the incident in the safest and most efficient manner possible. Initial USAR operations will be directed by the first arriving public safety officer who will assume command as the Incident Commander. Subsequent changes in the incident command structure will be based on the resource and management needs of the incident following established ICS procedures. Additional resources may include USAR Companies and USAR Crews or modular component of other USAR assets specifically trained and equipped for urban search and rescue operations. The USAR Company is capable of conducting search and rescue operations at incidents where technical expertise and equipment are required. USAR Crews are trained urban search and rescue personnel dispatched to the incident without rescue equipment. USAR Companies and Crews can be assigned as a single resource, grouped to form USAR Strike Teams or added to other resources to form a Task Force. USAR Single Resources, Strike Teams, and Task Forces are managed the same as other incident resources. Due to the unique hazards and complexity of urban search and technical rescue incidents, the Incident Commander may need to request a wide variety and amount of multidisciplinary resources.

THIS AGREEMENT is made and entered into this 27th day of May 2015, between these parties in the County of El Dorado, State of California:

- (a) Fire Protection Districts (Health and Safety Code Section §13801ff.),
- (b) El Dorado County Sheriff Office.
- (c) Community Services Districts (Government Code Section §61000ff.),
- (d) City Fire Departments (Government Code Section §36501ff.),
- (e) El Dorado Hills Fire Department (Water Code Section §30 et.seq),
- (f) Department of Forestry and Fire Protection (CAL FIRE) is a State forest fire agency (Resource Code §700ff.).
- (g) USFS is a Federal forest fire agency and is a subdivision of the U.S. Department of Agriculture,
- (h) California State Parks is a State agency (Title 14),
- (i) El Dorado County Parks and Trails

WHEREAS, each party maintains as part of its services an organized and equipped fire department charged with the duty of fire protection, rescue, emergency medical, and other emergency hazard mitigation services within its territorial limits; and

WHEREAS, investigation has disclosed that it would be of mutual benefit to each party in some circumstances if, mutually, the services of the fire department of one party were extended territorially to the aid of the other party; and

WHEREAS, the use of closest resource dispatching of rescue, medical, or other emergency without regard to jurisdiction or statutory responsibility is in the best interest of the citizens to insure orderly and coordinated use of all resources; and

WHEREAS, the need for organized specific skills, equipment, and training is needed for Urban Search and Rescue (USAR) to serve our citizens and visitors to El Dorado County,

WHEREAS, the creation of the El Dorado County Rescue Task Force will aid in organizing, equipping, and training our first responders,

WHEREAS, the El Dorado County Rescue Task Force will utilize the California Office of Emergency Service (CalOES) FIRESCOPE as its guiding document,

WHEREAS, each party on the West Slope desires to designate the *CAL FIRE* Emergency Command Center (ECC) located in Camino as the dispatch center for all West Slope fire, rescue and EMS agencies and further, each party desires to delegate initial dispatch command and control decisions for the purpose of closest resource dispatching, regardless of statutory or territorial jurisdictions; and

WHEREAS, each party hereto is agreeable to providing the requested initial action response within the territorial limits of the other party, and by this memorandum, the parties desire to integrate the terms and conditions of their negotiated master mutual aid agreement; and

WHEREAS, this agreement does not supersede nor release the authority and/or autonomy of each party (public safety agency) to serve its citizens, visitors, and community.

NOW, THEREFORE, for and in consideration of the covenants herein contained, performed, and to be performed, the parties hereto agree as follows:

#### I. AUTHORITY

The parties hereto, pursuant to the authority granted by Sections §13050, §13855, and §13879 of the California Health and Safety Code, do hereby agree to respond to emergencies outside their geographical limitations, and within the geographical limitations of the others.

#### II. LIABILITY INSURANCE

Each agency respectively shall provide and maintain a liability insurance policy and/or liability fund (agency self-insured) of not less than \$1,000,000 combined single limit, to protect it from casualty losses by reason of the activities contemplated by this agreement.

#### III. WORKER'S COMPENSATION

Each agency thereunder shall maintain Workers' Compensation insurance coverage or fund for its own employees without cost to the other parties.

#### IV. REIMBURSEMENT

All services rendered under this agreement shall be performed without reimbursement to the participating party or parties hereto, on an initial attack basis, in consideration of their mutual promises and services; each party shall bear its own costs thereunder. However, nothing contained herein precludes any party from claiming from any other person, entity or agency reimbursement to which it may be legally entitled from any other person or entity or agency not a party to this agreement or under the State of California Cooperative Agreement. Incidents extending beyond the initial attack phase may also be reimbursable under existing agreements between Federal, State, and local government agencies.

#### V. INDEMNIFICATION

Each party hereto waives all claims against any other participating party for compensation for any loss, damage, personal injury, or death which may arise due to conformance, or lack of conformance, under this agreement. It is expressly understood and agreed that no indemnification of or by either party to the other is stated or implied within this agreement. As between the parties, it is understood and agreed that the party being assisted shall be responsible to third persons only for those acts of the employees of the assisting party which are performed at the incident at the specific direction of an employee of the party being assisted.

#### VI. AGREEMENT ADMINISTRATION

Each agency shall be responsible jointly for the administration of this agreement. Each agency may exercise its authority to modify this agreement and enter into and modify the operational plan or communications plan. It is the intent of the parties of this agreement to adopt an operating plan and a communications plan which will become a part hereof. Any such plans or modification shall be in writing.

#### VII. ADEQUATE SERVICE LEVEL

This agreement shall not be interpreted to relieve either party from the necessity or obligation of furnishing adequate rescue services within any part of its territorial or jurisdictional limits.

#### VIII. ABILITY TO PERFORM

By entering this agreement, each party represents to the other that it has sufficient equipment and apparatus to perform its covenants thereunder.

#### IX. TERM OF AGREEMENT

This agreement shall continue in force without specific term provided, however, any party may terminate this agreement by giving to the other party ninety (90) days prior written notice of the parties' intention to terminate. Said termination notice shall be a certified copy of the resolution of termination adopted by the party's governing body with copies to the governing bodies of all parties to this agreement. Such termination shall be effective after the ninety days notice unless all parties mutually agree in advance to make it effective immediately.

#### X. SEVERABILITY

Parties agree that the invalidity in whole or in part of any provision of this agreement shall not void or affect the validity of any other provision.

#### XI. ENTIRE AGREEMENT

Parties agree that this agreement constitutes the entire agreement of the parties regarding the subject matter described herein and supersedes all prior communications, agreements, and promises, either oral or written.
